





Idaho Juvenile Justice Continuum




Idaho Juvenile Justice Collaboration



Community Pass-Through

24% of the Department's budget



These funds are distributed to counties and local communities to support effective programming and reintegration initiatives, which results in fewer commitments.

Critical elements to these incentive programs include:

- Collaboration with courts, county, state, families, & service providers
- Evidence-based approaches, matching appropriate services to needs

JCA/Tobacco

Funds: Juvenile justice programs and services in the county

Youth served: 4,932

SUDS

Funds: Substance Use Disorder treatment and services in the county

Youth served: 722 Success Rate: 96%

Mental Health Program

Funds: Wraparound services, therapeutic mentoring, polygraphs, etc.

Youth served: 185 Success Rate: 94%

Community Incentive Program

Funds: Transportation to treatment, counseling, family preservation, etc.

Youth served: 181 Success Rate: 94%

Re-Entry Program

Funds: Counseling, medication management, rent assistance, etc.

Youth served: 93 Success Rate: 90%





eniles in this profile comprise 19% of IDJC's male commitments. All of these juveniles have been identified as having sexual offending behavior. Mental health is frequently identified as a prity problem area. Frequently these juveniles have no substance use history with an average score of 1.3 out of 5 on the ICLA. However, one out of three juveniles in this profile has a history substance use or dependence. None of these juveniles have been identified by child protection as a victim of abuse or neglect. These juveniles are rarely elevated on the Jesness social ladjustment or asocial index subscales, and frequently not elevated on any of the other subscales. The average score on the Jesness for the ICLA is 1.6 out of 9. Additionally, juveniles in this file score lower in the family circumstances and parenting, history of family criminality, and the peer relations domains compared to all other profiles, indicating a strength.
