8:20 am (60 min)	Legislative Update – Kathleen Elliott, Executive Director, Public Defense Commission	Kathleen Elliott gave an update on the Public Defense Commission legislation: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The PDC has a duty to collect uniform data and report on caseload standards and expenditures. The PDC has worked hard to create a new rule regarding contracts. Contracts must be in writing between the counties and defending attorneys or firms that are working for the county. Idaho has appropriated about 13 million dollars in defense grants to counties to fund public defense, Idaho is obligated to provide a constitutional public defense, which has been delegated to the counties. Caseloads have been approved for defending attorneys by the Idaho State Legislature. She gave a brief history on the timeline of the caseload standards. The PDC provides free training for public defenders.

When data becomes available or when desired, can share the data they want.

<p>10:10 am (30 min)</p>	<p>Presentation of the ICJC Data Dashboard (Part II)— <i>Dr. Lisa Bostaph, Boise State University</i></p>	<p>Dr. Bostaph gave a presentation on the Data Warehouse:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ There are many questions that cannot be answered in the State of Idaho without data from the many state agencies within Idaho. <p>She turned the time to Monty Prow:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Idaho is one of only seven states that does not have a system in place that allows them to answer the many questions that are important for the State of Idaho to answer in regards to criminal justice. ○ Data Silos are a continuous challenge. It is extremely costly in terms of money and time. ○ The Data Dashboard will only house data that is approved by the State agencies. ○ Data will be no less secure, and may even be more secure, than data currently is. Personal Identifiers are removed from the data. Data owners will be able to approve or disapprove data requests at 4 different levels. ○ There was a question regarding if the AGs office has said whether or not if the Data Warehouse will be subject to the Public Records Law. What happens if someone makes a public records request? Answer: to be addressed in a later meeting. ○ There was another question as to the efficiency of the current system as opposed to the Data Dashboard. Answer: The Data Dashboard is extremely more efficient in the ballpark of hundreds of hours and tens of thousands of dollars saved. ○ There was a concern that the process is moving forward in a backward fashion based on the previous experience of similar projects. Answer: There has been much input from each organization. The process has been thoroughly vetted. The subcommittee reached a point that it needed

He discussed proposed legislation in Idaho’s neighboring states;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Montana: Restrict gun rights for those convicted of domestic violence. Increase stalking penalties, and broaden the definition of stalking. ○ Wyoming: Doing away with death penalty because it is expensive. No marrying minors, even with Judge’s decision. Make it a felony for a \$1000 of economic damages to company. ○ Utah: Lower penalty of possession of child pornography. Clean slate of misdemeanors after 7 years. All guns sold need to have locks. Add cruelty of animals to domestic violence. ○ Nevada: JRI comes to Nevada. Public discourse in Nevada is very heated in Nevada and Oregon as compared to Idaho. ○ Oregon: Unanimous juries. Psychotropic Mushrooms. ○ Washington: Improve mental health in the state. Allow medical marijuana in schools.
