Idaho's Sexual Assault Kit Initiative: This topic is getting national notice and we have given a workshop.  Data collection is reduced as the post collection information is the pre collection data for the next year.	

Victim service providers:

Follow up survey in the past October. Partnered with ISP and other policing agencies to examine individual effects of each statutory revision/addition and the cumulative effects of statutes.

Invitations were sent out in October 2021. There was collaboration with ISP PGR to inform goals of STOP grant funding. All agencies are required to complete the survey to receive funding.

Idaho crime victim survey (due to be released in January 2021 – some still ongoing):

Ongoing through Fall 2022. All agencies are required to complete the survey to receive funding. Some of the survey items are crime type(s), services received, services needed, opinions about services, crime victims' rights, reporting, and demographics. It is available in 5 languages. There have been 280+ responses.

### Victim clearinghouse:

Dashboard to connect people to service providers.

There is a lot of information on crime and victimization.

Working on new dashboards for data at the county level. Due to be completed in June 2022.

#### Release dates:

Summer 2022: crime victim provider survey

Fall 2022: effects of SAKI statutes on clearance rates

December 2022: crime victim survey

Spring 2023: domestic violence and housing issues

10:00 am (30 min)	Draft Legislation (Action) – Ashley Dowell (Sex Offenses Subcommittee)	Bill 2: Reason why the strikethrough: we haven't been able to charge for some time because there was a court opinion that decided it was unconstitutional. There are other crimes that would still fall under this statute.	
		Bill 3: Housekeeping matter. The rape and mal-rape were combined years ago and this was overlooked at the time. It assumes that the only victim could be a female.	

#### Bill 4:

Issues with delays in the postal service. The USPS said that mail will be delivered slower and we are already experiencing this. Offenders are not able to return their address verifications in the allotted time. This would give them a little more time. This also gives offender 7 days instead of 5 days to complete their registration.

#### Bill 1:

Repealed of fornication and adultery, crime against nature (also penalties). these terms are added in the incest statute. Added in a definition of "sexual intercourse."

Repealed because the us supreme court decision. Court made it clear that clear consent is constitutional. They don't want to regulate conduct with consenting adults. Most states have already made these changes.

Crime against nature needed a language update. This has been updated for understanding in the sodomy section. Also includes language for acts that include animals or human remains.

New section 18-6602 sexual abuse of an animal:

Modeled after another state, using Idaho definitions.

We wanted to make sure there wasn't risk to our Ag industry when they are doing their normal appropriate duties such as veterinary.

New section 18-6603 sexual abuse of human remains:

Want to make sure that if this occurs, there is still a way to prosecute. It is very uncommon to see these crimes but there needs to be a way to prosecute if it does occur. Again, there is a safe harbor for those in an industry that work with human remains.

#### 6604:

Amends allow for repeal of crime against nature.

#### 18-8303:

Sex offender registration: strikethrough of crime against nature (recommending not adding in new sections as this is intended for violent acts)

#### 18-8304:

Housekeeping of removing references but add in animal and human remains. We addressed those that have already been registered for the repealed statutes. The recommendation is to have those cases litigated on a case-by-case basis. They will stay.

#### 18-310:

Deals with gun rights. Removed crimes against nature as it is repealed. Discussed adding in the new sections but recommended not adding them as they are not the violent acts such as the others listed.

When a risk assessment is required for parole. Animal and human remains was added in place of the repealed section. They are considered risk factors for recidivism.

#### 39-1113:

Daycares: adding animal and human remains.

Deviant sexual behavior that could be a risk to children.

What would be the next steps? Who would carry this? This would be a recommendation to the Governor's office. If it moves forward, it would be brought by ICJC.
