	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Potential legislation/changes to the Idaho Missing Persons Clearinghouse Update on Washington MMIP Bill 	<p>ISP gave the committee a proposal for the cost of an alert that would be sent out to the public for those that are not children. It would be an endangerment factor alert. There is a legislative proposal that would create this alert. ISP also has to input data by hand for every case that comes in. There was a partnership with the Alzheimer's association to see if there could be something done this session. Senator Abby Lee is interested in moving these proposals forward. They are looking to do the alert as well as updating the clearinghouse. There was a suggestion to have a subcommittee for the alert system to develop endangerment factors and a plan.</p> <p>There is a bill that would be an equivalent of an amber alert here in Idaho. In Washington, one of the concerns is that they have multiple alerts and it is fracturing the system. Some of the problems with having too many alerts is the public become numb to them. Might be a little better the way Idaho is approaching it as there are less alerts.</p>
